Modesty, whimsy, and clarity of design grace the work of Joe Brainard (1941-1994), an artist and writer whose evocations of memory and desire perhaps found their greatest expression in his memoir-poem I Remember. Composed of a sequence of brief recollections, the poem's standardized format admits an incredible variety of images and feelings: "I remember Greyhound buses at night... I remember candy cigarettes like chalk... I remember leaning up against walls in queer bars..."
