What is a third- or fourth-degree tear? A third-degree tear is a tear that extends

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into the muscle that controls the anus (the anal sphincter). If the tear extends further into the lining of the anus or rectum it is known as a fourth-degree tear. Image 1 shows a perineum without tears. Image 2 shows where the different types of tears occur.

Approximately 1-3% of women who deliver vaginally will experience third and fourth degree tears. Factors such as having a ventouse or forceps delivery, having a baby weighing more than 4 kg or having a baby that is “back to back” at delivery increase the risk that you may have a third or fourth degree tear.

Third and fourth degree tears are an uncommon complication of childbirth that may affect your bowel, bladder and sexual function for varying amounts of time. A third degree tear is a tear or laceration through the perineal muscles and the muscle layer that surrounds the anal canal.

Perineal tears - third and fourth degree

Severe perineal injury (third and fourth degree laceration) at the time of vaginal

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delivery increases the risk of fecal incontinence, chronic perineal pain, and dyspareunia.¹⁻⁵ Studies suggest the prevalence of severe perineal injury may vary by racial group.⁶ The purpose of the current study was to examine rates of severe perineal injury in different Asian and Pacific Islander subgroups.

Perineal Tears - Third and Fourth Degree (OASIS)

Third or fourth degree perineal tears and obstetric anal sphincter injuries (OASI) are other terms used to describe this type of injury. A third degree tear is an injury to the perineum involving the anal sphincter (muscle controlling the anus), and a fourth degree tear involves the anal sphincter and the anal mucosa (the lining of the anus or rectum). ¹

Results: The rate of reported third- or fourth-degree perineal tears tripled from 1.8 to 5.9% during the study period. The rate of episiotomy varied between 30 and 36%. An increasing proportion of ventouse deliveries (from 67.8 to 78.6%) and non-instrumental deliveries (from 15.1 to 19.1%) were assisted by an episiotomy.

Third- And Fourth-Degree Perineal Tears Among Primiparous ...

Although infection is rare after a perineal laceration, in the presence of a third or fourth degree laceration infection can be associated with significant morbidity.
